Work Together to Protect Our Lives

Nobody knows when such natural disasters as large-scale earthquakes and typhoons will occur.

Those who were rescued by their families or neighbors account for approx. 80% of all retrieved from collapsed houses when the Great Hanshin-Awaji Earthquake occurred.

In the event of a large-scale and wide-area disaster, people trapped in collapsed buildings must be rescued as quickly as possible; however, it is difficult for the official rescue teams to promptly arrive in all rescue sites. Therefore you need to be aware that "saving your own life and helping each other in your neighborhood community to minimize damage" will lead to saving the precious life of each person.

What should you prepare to minimize damage from a disaster? How should you act in case that a disaster occurs?

We created "Disaster Prevention Guidebook" describing what action to take during a disaster and what preparations to make for it.

Please use this "Disaster Prevention Guidebook" for your regular disaster prevention activities, such as reconfirming your knowledge about and readiness for disasters, so that each of you can calmly take the right action without panicking during a disaster.
